FOLLOW-UP ON RECENT TP MEETINGS

SOUTHAMPTON, 20TH MAY

John Coleman (The Nook, Hook Village, Warsash, Southampton) organised a TP meeting on 20th May in Southampton, with Mairead Corrigan, Mike Cooley, Bryan Gould and James Robertson as speakers. It was well reported in the local press. Subsequently a TP group has been set up in Fareham — contact Martin Morgan (Manor Cottage, Church Path, Fareham, Hants) who is planning a second TP meeting for this region in November. John Meacock (45a Avenue Road, Southampton) runs a Monday Night meeting on TP themes. Ann Stent of 280 Priory Road, Southampton (Friends of the Earth) also plans some kind of follow-up. John Coleman tells us that Fareham is in great social turmoil after the introduction of a £7½ million shopping precinct (with its own internal 'police' force), and that Jean Harvey, Editor of the local magazine "Spotlight" (219 West Street, Fareham) is among those interested in the possible contribution that the new TP initiatives might make to solving local problems.

EDUCATION, 4TH MARCH

Catherine Gibson (11 Friars Stile Road, Richmond, Surrey) writes: "I thought the meeting began very well; just as I had expected, throwing up ideas and examples of how education can be carried on outside the main stream. It also touched on the fundamental failure of established formal education. But it didn't go anywhere from there. ... I would like to follow up the lines which seemed so promising in the early part of the day - for example Peter Abbs's idea on what is the culture which we should be transmitting; Richard Posner's experience with small groups, and the use of non-professional teachers; Colin Hamer's theory and practice with groups of prisoners. So if there is a group of people wanting to go further along these lines of enquiry, I would like to join them. There must be something we can discover which will give us a new direction in education."

<u>Judy Brander</u> (Beckenham Forum - 29 Top Park, Beckenham, Kent BR3 2RU) and <u>Janice Dolley</u> (Bridge Trust - 20 The Chase, Reigate, Surrey) have been exploring how this kind of follow-up might best be taken forward.

"I found the March TP conference on Education most stimulating and encouraging. My only slight caveat, and especially in looking through the Newsletter, is that an awful lot of people seem to be writing about 'the alternative society' and trying to practise an alternative lifestyle in various ways, somehow as an end in itself. In this process one is sometimes in danger of losing sight of the content of living. ... This press was set up to provide an outlet for the production, or reproduction, of work which combines creativity and imagination with social and cultural values." WHO WANTS POLITICS?

Does the very act of taking an interest in current politics help to perpetuate an immature, even dehumanising, way of getting things decided and done? At best, does it waste time and energy that might be better spent? Some of our readers think so, certainly. But others don't, especially when a British general election is in the offing.

An ALTERNATIVES AGENDA FOR PARTY POLITICS (by <u>Harford Thomas</u> and <u>James Robertson</u>) was published in "The Guardian" on 3rd July. It included a selection of key questions with which to challenge candidates of all parties. A copy is enclosed (for UK addressees only).

A NEW ALLIANCE (or GREEN ALLIANCE) may be emerging. About 60 people, including Maurice Ash (Dartington), Edward Goldsmith (Ecologist), Gerard Morgan-Grenville (Society for Environmental Improvement), Satish Kumar (Resurgence), and leading members of the Ecology Party, met recently in Conway Hall to discuss the possibilities of a political initiative. DEVELOPMENT

Growth maniacs still argue that the overdeveloped countries must continue to consume vastly more than their fair share of the planet's resources so that the "wealth" thus created can trickle down to the less developed countries in the form of trade and aid. But the protagonists of "another development" are growing in number and strength.

The concept of ANOTHER DEVELOPMENT, as need-oriented, endogenous, self-reliant, and ecologically sound, was put forward in the 1975 Dag Hammarskjold Report "What Now? Another Development". Follow-up publications include "Another Development: Approaches and Strategies", and several issues of "Development Dialogue". (For example, the 1978:1 issue concentrates on Another Development in Health.) PEACE

Peace, social justice, economic wellbeing and ecological balance are the key aims of the <u>Institute for World Order</u>, 1140 Avenue of the Americas, New York, NY 10036, USA. In a recent issue of MACROSCOPE, the Institute compares today's growing movement for the abolition of war and international injustice to the successful movement of over a century ago which was dedicated to the abolition of slavery.

Preparations for a peace initiative by the EAST-WEST PEACE PEOPLE are gathering momentum. A Peace Charter is being drafted. Support is being sought worldwide from those who believe that governments use eachother's policies to justify their own preparations for war, and that only by bypassing governments can people break the deadlock. The National Council for a WORLD PEACE TAX FUND (2111 Florida Ave NW, Washington, DC 20008, USA) wants legislation to enable the taxes of conscientious objectors to go into a fund for peace projects, instead of being spent for military purposes. Supporting organisations in Britain include The Peace Tax Campaign of the Peace Pledge Union (Stanley Keeble, c/o Dick Sheppard House, 6 Endsleigh Street, London WClH ODX) and the Friends Peace and International Relations Committee (Frank Williams, Friends House, Euston Road, London NWl 2BJ).

Addressing the Max Planck Institut, Munich, in April, <u>Ciaran McKeown</u> of the NORTHERN IRELAND PEACE PEOPLE argued that the example of nonviolent resolution of conflict could only come from small places like Northern Ireland, not from super-powers like the United States or the Soviet Union which had such overwhelming military machines to dismantle. He therefore called for every possible international support, since this was not only in the interests of peace in Northern Ireland, but was the only real hope for the human race. "Peace By Peace: The Other Side Of Northern Ireland" is published fortnightly (annual sub: UK, Ireland and overseas surface mail £5, overseas airmail £6) by the Peace People, Fredheim, 224 Lisburn Road, Belfast.

WOMEN, CHILDREN AND MEN
