MONEY

"Experts now recognise that there is a significant and growing probability that the financial system may collapse". Shann Turnbull's (see p.10) published paper on WHAT EVERYONE SHOULD KNOW ABOUT BANKING AND MONEY - ESPECIALLY BANKERS AND ECONOMISTS. We also recommend his SELECTING A LOCAL CURRENCY. Both are available, price \$A 1.20 each, from Options, The Australian Adam Smith Club (PO Box 387, Crows Nest, NSW 2065, Australia).

"Unless the dishonest centralised government monopoly of money can be broken, no significant social reform is possible". Robert Borsodi, quoted by Robert Swann (E.F. Schumacher Society, Box 76, RD3 Great Barrington, MA 01230, USA) who specifies that a local currency should be (1) consistent with customary accounting practices, (2) redeemable in commodities of real value, (3) be a universal measure of value, but based on local production, (4) be community-controlled, perhaps through a non-profit bank.

Swann and Turnbull are both contributors to THE HANDBOOK OF TOOLS FOR COMMUNITY ECONOMIC CHANGE (\$20 + \$1.50 postage from ITDG Publications Office, PO Box 337, Croton-on-Hudson, NY 10520, USA).

David Cadman (Wolfson College, Cambridge CB3 9BB) and James Robertson (The Old Bakehouse, Cholsey, Nr. Wallingford, Oxon OX10 9NU) will shortly be starting a year-long study for the EEC and the OECD on SOURCES OF FINANCE FOR LOCAL EMPLOYMENT INITIATIVES. Relevant information and ideas will be welcome.

INVESTING IN THE LOCAL ECONOMY by <u>Chris Collinge</u> (£3 from Community Projects Foundation, 60 Highbury Grove, London N5 2AG) is a useful conventional analysis, leading to policy proposals for local authorities, in Britain which are taking on new responsibilities for local economic development.

The Planning Exchange (186 Bath Street, Glasgow G2 4HG) publishes FRED (Financial Resources for Development) and LEDIS (Local Economic Development Information Service).

In a recent 7-page paper <u>D.C. Artingstall</u> (47 Shipston Road, Stratford-on-Avon, Warwicks) recommends MUNICIPAL BANKS as steps towards freeing local government from financial dependence on central government.

ALTERNATIVE INVESTMENTS: OPPORTUNITIES FOR QUAKERS (a 62pp pamphlet, 90p + 23p postage, from Friends Book Centre, Euston Road, London NW1) contains information and listings that other people, as well as Ouakers, will find useful.

INHERITOR'S NEWSLETTER, Spring 1984 (free from Patrick Boase, 4 Striven Gardens, Glasgow G20 6DU) is about managing money in ways which contribute to desired social change.

ABUNDANCE is a quarterly journal published by the Social Credit Centre (V.R. Hadkins, c/o 32 Totley Grange Road, Sheffield S17 4AF), which campaigns for reform in the money system, and in particular asserts "that the money from time to time needed to deal with our expanding requirements ought not to come into being merely as the counterpart of interest-bearing debt to the banks, but should be created and issued by the state on behalf of society as a whole".

CITIES AND THE BUILT ENVIRONMENT

"A typical urban area of 1 million people requires a daily input of about 2000 tons of food which is entirely dependent on a fuel-driven agriculture and transportation system. The same urban area also requires for its sustenance a daily input of 9500 tons of fuel and 650,000 tons of fresh water. Like the Roman Empire, industrialised societies become more and more dependent for their survival on resources far away from their cities, or even from their national boundaries. We know what eventually happened to the Roman Empire". Sam Nilsson in SCIENTIFIC RESEARCH AND SOCIAL GOALS - see p.11.

The United Nation's University and the International Foundation for Development Alternatives are launching a project on Urban Self-Reliance. ANOTHER URBAN DEVELOPMENT will be based on urban agriculture, waste recycling, energy recovery and conservation, self-help housing, self-help provision of social services, household crafts and industries, and reconversion of idle productive capacities. WORK

The de-linking of money incomes from paid work is a necessary consequence of the end of full employment. The National Council for Voluntary Organisations (NCVO, 26 Bedford Square, London WClB 3HU) is one of a growing number of people and organisations now examining the practicalities of a BASIC INCOME SCHEME (or Social Dividend).

Charles Handy's THE FUTURE OF WORK: A GUIDE TO A CHANGING SOCIETY (Basil Blackwell, 1984, £4.95) is sensible, informative and very useful. It will influence many people who still identify themselves with mainstream business and management thinking, and will help them to look beyond employment and beyond the status quo" to new forms and meanings of work.

THE FUTURE OF WORK (£3 from John Wadey, Work and Society, c/o National Westminster Bank, 210 Pentonville Road, London N1 9JT) is also the title of a report by OPUS (Olya Khaleelee, 10 Golders Rise, London NW4) of a Talkabout held in West Yorkshire in October/November 1983. "There was virtual unanimity that full employment has gone for good... A minority have a clear vision of a restructured way of living... Many others are deeply dissatisfied with society as it is, see the need for a new conception (which they can't quite formulate), and would welcome leadership towards an alternative future".

In EXEMPLARS - PRIVATE AND PUBLIC - THE CASE FOR THE BRICOLEUR, one of a number of stimulating recent papers, Prof. Denis Pym (London Business School, Sussex Place, Regents Park, London NW1 4SA) suggests that, between the industrial ethic of Work and the post-industrial ethic of Re-creation, we have now developed a transitional ethic of Resourcefulness; and that in matters of personal responsibility, dignity and control over our own affairs the status of self-employment is now preferable to employment.

"Working for oneself is already in the process of becoming the norm". THE ENTREPRENEUR, No.9 (Alston, Cumbria CA9 3RP).

In a 35-page paper on THE DEVELOPMENT OF A LEISURE ETHIC: SOME PRACTICAL ISSUES FOR THE FUTURE (E3 from Leisure Consultants, Lint Growis, Foxearth, Sudbury, Suffolk), <u>Bill Martin</u> and <u>Sandra Mason</u> argue that without a more positive view of leisure's role in our lives, frustration of the work ethic will bring continuing social conflict.

In JOB LOSS, UNEMPLOYMENT AND PSYCHOLOGICAL WELLBEING (in "Role Transitions", eds. Allen and van de Vliert, Plenum, 1984) Prof. Peter Warr of Sheffield University finds - surprise! surprise! - that "lower psychological wellbeing is observed in those unemployed people who are more committed to the employed role", and asks whether high levels of employment commitment should "be reduced through counseling, teaching or social pressures, in periods and in regions where unemployment is so high that the probability of finding a job is negligible".

Michael Weatherley's (22 Bell Street, Whitchurch, Hants RG28 7AE) recent research on MANAGERIAL UNEMPLOYMENT is about what out-of-work managers feel and do, and contains a bibliography. Cost per copy runs out at £10, but the bibliography is available separately for £1.

OPENING UP THE WORLD OUTSIDE EMPLOYMENT (<u>Peter Waldman</u>, Industrial Training Research Unit, Lloyds Bank Chambers, Hobson Street, Cambridge CBl INL) is an initiative to develop an information, guidance and support service for young people who may not find jobs after education and training schemes such as YTS, and to provide student-centred learning of life competences.

YOUTHAID (Sheila Tucker, 9 Poland Street, London WIV 3DG) are co-ordinating proposals for helping young people who have been through the Youth Training Scheme and can't find jobs.

YOUTH CALL'S (c/o Social Services Dept., Springfield, Maidstone, Kent) recent contributions to public debate on the expansion of community service for young people include three pamphlets (April 1984, El each) by Alec Dickson on: California Conservation Corps, Study Service in Hong Kong and elsewhere, and West Germany's Zivildienst.

The transition from the industrial to the post-industrial age can be a further step forward in human evolution. So it's good to see Guy Dauncey's two books, THE UNEMPLOYMENT HANDBOOK and NICE WORK IF YOU CAN GET IT (National Extension College), reviewed in the Teilhard Review and Journal of Creative Evolution, Spring 1984 (£2 from Teilhard Centre, 23 Kensington Square, London W8).

"All forms of work concentrate in the busy households who are also more likely to be growing their own vegetables or brewing beer ... The growth of new part-time employment is likely to add to the benefit of households whose head is already in employment". Ray Pahl, in WORK AND SOCIETY NEWSLETTER, April 1984 (56 Britton Street, London EClM 5NA), on the increasing polarisation between households which are able to work both formally and informally, and those which have decreasing opportunities for either kind of work. In the same issue Jonathan Bradshaw discusses features of the present benefits system which discourage the members of less fortunate households from working.

Barbara Senior's (Community Education, Open University, Walton Hall, Milton Keynes, MK7 6AA) UNEMPLOYMENT PROJECT (1984-1986) is to develop and disseminate learning materials for unemployed people.

LEARNING FOR LIFE: OVERCOMING THE SEPARATION OF WORK AND LEARNING, a recent report to the Canadian Government by a Panel chaired by <u>Anne Ironside</u> (Canadian Association for Adult Education, Corbett House, 29. Prince Arthur Avenue, Toronto M5R 1B2, Canada), recommends commitment to "Canada as a learning society", to a right to learn throughout life, and to retraining people threatened with job loss and skill obsolescence.

Hans Noak (Flat 3, 28 Castlebar Park, London W5 1BU) is a consultant on working together and mutual support on the job.

WORK FOR THE FUTURE is a useful guide to alternatives, published (1984) by the <u>Cambridge Students Union</u> (4 Round Church Street, Cambridge).

The WORK RESEARCH UNIT (Steel House, 11 Tothill Street, London SW1H 9NF) is a useful source of information on publications, etc.

TWO KEY APPOINTMENTS

Jonathon Porritt becomes Director of FRIENDS OF THE EARTH (377 City Road, London EC1) on 1st September 1984.

Ernst von Weizsacker becomes Director of the INSTITUTE FOR EUROPEAN ENVIRONMENTAL POLICY (Aloys Schulte Str. 6, 53 Bonn, Fed. Rep. of Germany) on 1st September 1984.

EDUCATION

"The justification for 'school' in its present form no longer exists. There is now no reason to take children into a large inhuman centre for 7 hours a day, 40 weeks a year, to be looked after and institutionalised by kindly teachers - 'parent substitutes'. We are depriving the community of its young. There is another way. It is in community education". Philip Toogood's THE HEAD'S TALE (£4 inc. postage from Dialogue Publications, 11 The Wharfage, Ironbridge, Telford, Shropshire) is the story of his teaching experience since the '60s, culminating in the suppression - by conservative local politicians and a conservative educational bureaucracy - of his successful six-year experiment in community education and "the management of enabling" as the Head of a comprehensive school. His Dialogue Publications also plans to publish DIALOGUE, a new magazine for partnership between teachers, parents and local people.

The world studies teacher, who wishes to promote student involvement and develop students' action skills in development education, environmental education, multicultural education, human rights education or peace education, is on potentially controversial ground. But "the logic of world studies is that the school should be in the community, the community in the school". Dr. David Selby in a recent paper on WORLD STUDIES, THE PARTICIPATORY CLASSROOM, THE OPEN SCHOOL, from the World Studies Teacher Training Centre (York University, Heslington, York YOl 5DD).

Much the same is true of futures education. See <u>Richard Slaughter</u>'s FUTURES EDUCATION: WHY WE NEED TO TEACH FOR TOMORROW (Occasional Paper No.5, Centre for Peace Studies, St. Martin's College, Lancaster LA1 3JD).

The June 1984 issue of RECONCILIATION QUARTERLY (£1.25 from 9 Coombe Road, New Malden, Surrey KT3 4QA) contains valuable articles about Peace Studies - in schools, in Avon, at Bradford, at Lancaster, and at Selly Oak.

MULTICULTURAL EDUCATION is a major theme of The New Era, Vol.65, No.3, 1984. (£1.50 from Joan Watson, 54 Fontarabia Road, London SW11 5PF).

Sally Willington (278 Battersea Park Road, London SWll) is secretary of the NEW UNIVERSITY EDUCATIONAL TRUST, whose proposals for a new university include a learning web of local study circles supported by a "living as learning" centre.

In May 1984 the <u>Centre for Continuing Education</u>, Australian National University (GPO Box 4, Canberra, ACT 2601, Australia) published a statement of intent to launch a 5-year programme of research on RECURRENT EDUCATION FOR AUSTRALIA, and would like to hear from potential participants.

RESPONSIBLE HUSBANDRY AS A BASIC EDUCATIONAL PRINCIPLE is a discussion paper published by the Farm and Food Society. (40p from FFS, see p. 3).

VIITTAKIVI is a study and conference centre where adults of any age from different cultural, religious, national, political, educational or occupational backgrounds can meet to study and explore the personal, social and international questions of our time. Information about their autumn and winter courses from Iain Kirkcaldy-Willis (Viittakivi International Center, SF-14700 Hauho, Finland).

Anthony Deavin (18 Commondale, West Putney, London SW15) is helping to develop new schools in London, and organising a course this autumn on AYURVEDA - the medical science of ancient India which provides a conceptual basis for a holistic approach to health and disease.

HEALTH

BEYOND HEALTH CARE is the subject of an important "Working Conference on Healthy Public Policy", to be held in Toronto on 9th-12th October 1984. This could be an important milestone in the shift away from our present obsession with sickness and how National Sickness Services are run, towards the promotion of healthy ways of living in a health-creating society. Information from Dr. Trevor Hancock (64 Merton St., Toronto M4S 1A1, Canada).

<u>Swedish Secretariat for Futures Studies</u>, TIME TO CARE: Pergamon, 1984, (no price stated). Important study on the crisis of the welfare state and a new direction for the future of health and welfare services.

"In many ways, women-and-health groups offer to ordinary women what the consciousness-raising-groups of the Women's Movement offered in the past to middle-class women". Jane Greetham in "Community Development through a Community Health Project" in RADICAL COMMUNITY MEDICINE, Summer 1984 (£1.50 from Alex Scott-Samuel, 5 Lyndon Drive, Liverpool L18 6HP).

SELF-HELP AND HEALTH IN EUROPE: NEW APPROACHES IN HEALTH CARE (198pp, eds. Stephen Hatch and Ilona Kickbusch, WHO-Europe, Copenhagen) is about "a re-orientation in health-care provision which may prove as fundamental in the long run as the rise of the medical profesion 150 years ago. The keyword that symbolises this development is SELF-HELP". Case-studies include the Nottingham Self-Help Groups Project (Judy Wilson, Self-Help Team, 33 Mansfield Road, Nottingham NGl 3FF).

HEALTH EDUCATION NEWS from <u>Dr. Rosmarie Erben</u> (International Union for Health Education, European Bureau, c/o BZgA, 200 Ostmerheimer Strasse, 5 Koln-Merheim, Fed. Rep. of Germany).

HEALTH, SAFETY AND THE CONSUMER is a powerful collection of reports (April 1983) from the Consumers Union of Japan (3-13-29 Nakameguro, Meguro-Ku, Tokyo 153, Japan). Foods, medicine, detergents, baby-milk, tobacco, cars, nuclear power, and herbicides are among the health hazards covered.

The ENVIRONMENT FOR HYPERSENSITIVES ORGANISATION (Rayne Harvey, c/o 5 Kilham, Orton Goldhay, Peterborough PE2 OSU) seeks support to become an independent trust, building specially designed homes, and providing other help and advice, to people who get ill from food additives, chemicals and other forms of environmental pollution.

Miriam Polunin, THE RIGHT WAY TO EAT, TO FEEL GOOD - OR EVEN BETTER: Dent, 1984, £1.95. Published in association with Ecoropa (Crickhowell, Powys, Wales NP8 1TA), from which three leaflets are also available on "Food Additives. Are the Risks Worthwhile?", "Food and Health. A Guide to Healthier Eating", and "Cancer Prevention. A Self-Help Guide to Reducing the Risks".

Grassroots food experts from all parts of the earth will meet at the WORLD FOOD ASSEMBLY, Rome, 12th-15th November 1984. Details and background from Robin Sharp (WFA 84, 15 Devonshire Terrace, London W2).

FIND YOUR FEET (Glyn Davys, 13-15 Frognal, London NW3) is developing small-scale production of leaf protein in third world villages. Newsletter. Also see Plu Glosa Nota (newsletter No.16 - 45p from 132 Kew Road, Richmond, Surrey TW9 2AU).

Ulrich and Francesca Loenig (Centre for Human Ecology, 15 Buccleuch Place, Edinburgh EH8 9LN) plan a European workshop in Human Ecology for May 1985 on an agricultural/land use topic. Notes available on BARRIERS TO AN ECOLOGICAL SOCIETY and a possible agenda for a workshop on Meat.

THE NEW ECONOMICS

THE OTHER ECONOMIC SUMMIT (TOES), attended by 140 people from 16 countries in London in June, was generally judged a success. Conference papers and information about follow-up from Paul Ekins and his colleagues at TOES (42 Warriner Gardens, London SW11 4DU).

"The costs of growth become ever more visible. Maybe the growth was just the registration of benefits before costs". When world leaders, e.g. at summits, promote economic growth, they may be seen "as a group of smokers trying to convince the world about the necessity for more smoking and to prevent non-smokers putting up irritating restrictions". From ECONOMIC GROWTH AND THE ROLE OF SCIENCE by Soren Bergstrom (Dept. of Business Administration, Stockholm University, S-106 91 Stockholm, Sweden), a 24-page summary of proceedings of a recent conference.

"We need a new set of economic and social values and the necessary legislation and institutions to develop a new kind of entrepreneur... Social entrepreneurship is the task of creating and distributing wealth with people in mind rather than profit". From THE THIRD SECTOR ECONOMY in Community Business News (from Community Business Scotland, 39 Vicar Street, Falkirk, Scotland).

The Rocky Mountain Institute's ECONOMIC RENEWAL PROJECT is developing a model and process for sustainable, locally based, economic development: (1) by using local money and local work to meet local needs for energy, food, water, health, shelter, finance and insurance; (2) by giving investment in existing local enterprise as high a priority as investment in new, imported ventures; (3) by assessing all the long-term costs as well as benefits of attracting new industry in from outside. "In the past, the entrepreneur's pursuits were money and recognition. Today, they are autonomy, creativity and adventure... From GETTING WOMEN STARTED IN BUSINESS - SOME NORDIC EXPERIENCES, Aspen Institute for Humanistic Studies (c/o AB Samhallsradet, Kommendorsgatan 2, 114 48 Stockholm, Sweden).

"Small honest businesses sure have an advantage when it comes to fun". FUN IN BUSINESS is one of the classes offered by Noren Workshops (62 Stanton Street, San Francisco, CA 94114, USA), a member of the Briarpatch Network.

Frank Rosten (950 Old Trace Road, Palo Alto, CA 94306, USA) has started SYSTEMS THAT WORK. STW's first business/conservation venture aims to reduce the money and material now wasted by users of pallets.

Heritage Holidays (Markham House, Broad Street, Wokingham, Berkshire) is an ICOM co-operative, set up by professional people with Third World Concerns, to give more people an opportunity to see the development work being done in the Reading/Oxford area. Friends for Community Development (Brown House, 97 Talbot Avenue, Medford, MA 02155, USA) is an international network concerned with the regeneration of communities as an aspect of the emerging new-age economy.

Carlos Aveline (Caixa Postal 191, 95600 - Taquara - RS, Brazil), whose book FROM THE BOTTOM UPWARDS - UTOPY IN BRAZIL comes out this month, is involved in small cooperatives with former unemployed - a rarticipatory community health programme, and backyard vegetable gardens in the poorest sections of the town (population 35,000).

NEW INITIATIVE Ltd (see p.16 - 18th September) has been set up by Francis Kinsman, author of "The New Agenda", together with Liz Hosken and Edward Posey - all of the BUSINESS NETWORK - to launch a series of seminars on the social changes affecting business, and in particular on the theme that people matter most in business.

In STRATEGIES FOR A NEW AGE in Human Resource Management, Fall 1983, management consultant Roger Harrison (1214 Walnut Street, Berkeley, CA 94709, USA) concludes that, from a systems point of view, strategic thinking on the part of an organisation now has to be "a search for meaning, rather than a search for advantage".

"If development is environmentally unsound and non-sustainable, if it damages and destroys the forests and water and soil and clean air, then it is bad development, development that will not work. And phoney development of this kind hits hardest at the poor". From ON THE SIDE OF THE FUTURE: DEVELOPMENT, ENVIRONMENT - AND PEOPLE by Jon Tinker (Earthscan, 10 Percy Street, London WIP ODR).

In DEVELOPMENT FORUM, July/August 1984 (UN, PO Box 5850, Grand Central Station, New York, NY 10163, USA) the African food crisis is directly attributed to the destruction of self-sufficiency. A new "balance between the production of cash crops for export and food crops for domestic consumption has become urgent".

"By encouraging energy efficiency, recycling and the development of renewable energy sources, and by burning coal cleanly and only when necessary, nations will help to protect their forests, crops, lakes and people for generations. The connections are real, and so are the consequences of ignoring them". From AIR POLLUTION, ACID RAIN AND THE FUTURE OF FORESTS by Sandra Postel (Worldwatch Paper 58; \$2 from Worldwatch Institute, 1776 Massachusetts Avenue NW, Washington DC 20036, USA - or from Third World Publications, 151 Stratford Road, Birmingham Bll 1RD).

ACID Magazine is an attractively produced new popular science magazine (free from the Environment Protection Board, Box 1302, S-171 25 Solna, Sweden). One article in the Spring 1984 issue accuses British electricity and coal interests of deliberately delaying effective action against acid rain. Another accuses the Science Correspondent of the Daily Telegraph of consciously distorting the facts about recent research, "in line with the large British power companies intentions to spread confusing and untruthful facts in the acidification debate".

"As an issue of massive, wrongheaded forecasting and investment, nuclear power could soon be seen as the Vietnam War of the 1980s".
