#### NEWS AND NOTES

Many people will have been shocked and saddened to hear of <u>Steve</u> (<u>Prof. S.L.</u>) <u>Cook</u>'s sudden death in October. His contribution to TP meetings and to the work and interests of his friends and co-workers will be very much missed. In September 1979 he gave an important paper to the Operational Research Society's annual conference on "Can a Social Wage Solve Unemployment?" Shortly before he died he played a leading part in setting up the new Birmingham Futures Network (see p.3).

James Robertson and Alison Pritchard are settling into their new base at Ironbridge which - a birthplace of the Industrial Revolution and an internationally known centre for industrial archaeology - we hope will also become a centre for the post-industrial future. Practical problems loom large. Can anyone recommend good sources of advice on a "total systems" approach to heating/insulation/ventilation (including gas, solid fuel, double glazing, solar panels, etc.), together with structural alterations - including a new greenhouse? There must be a growing demand for integrated architectural/energy advice of this kind, and an information clearing house seems to be needed.

We are already missing the practical help of many people in the London area since TP started in 1975. In particular Ruth Challen (Christ Church Rectory, 49 Colombo Street, London SEI 8DP) gave us invaluable help with newsletters, correspondence, etc. If anyone knows of people in the Ironbridge area who might like to become involved, please put us in touch. We shall continue to hold meetings in London, so we shall still need volunteers to help with those.

<u>James Robertson</u> will be on a speaking tour of the United States from 10th February to 16th March to promote the US edition of THE SANE ALTERNATIVE. Robert Buntz (River Basin Publishing Company, PO Box 30573, St. Paul, Minnesota 55175, USA) is co-ordinating the trip.

Don Benjamin (New South Wales Humanist Society, Humanist House, 10 Shepherd Street, Chippendale, 2008, Australia) and Shann Turnbull (MAI Ltd., PO Box 4359, Sydney, NSW 2001, Australia) are co-ordinating James Robertson's visit to Sydney and Melbourne, Australia from 30th March to 12th April.

Some people still think of Humanism as an old-fashioned, dogmatic opposition to spirituality. They should read Peter Cadogan's (1 Hampstead Hill Gardens, London NW3) lecture on RELIGIOUS HUMANISM in the Ethical Record for January 1980 (annual sub. £1 from SPES, Conway Hall, Red Lion Square, London WClR 4RL), and the writings of Robert Waller (87 Oxford Road, Moseley, Birmingham B13 9SG) and Henryk Skolimowski (Dartington Hall, Totnes, Devon TQ9 6JE) on ECOLOGICAL HUMANISM.

Alison Williams (12 Homefield Road, London SW19 4QE), writing about the November TP meeting on Peace, says that she "came away with a bad conscience that I'd done nothing to support the UN or UNA that would compensate for not having a UNA speaker on the afternoon panel. lady said something about the UN in the morning didn't she; to be shouted down by John Papworth, if I remember rightly. On reflection, I wondered whether TP might organise a conference on the Small Is Beautiful/Only One Earth perspectives." She recommends Robert Muller's book MOST OF ALL THEY TAUGHT ME HAPPINESS (Doubleday, \$7.95) whose main theme is that the UN represents part of a collective brain of humanity, and badly needs input of spiritual energy with a "new age/evolution of consciousness" orientation. We agree about the need to reconcile the apparent conflict between decentralism and internationalism, and others have suggested a similar conference - with special reference to the Third World. Not possible for TP this year, but we now have it on the agenda for the future.

The Commission for the Future (PO Box 5053, 1 The Terrace, Wellington 1, New Zealand) is producing a series of booklets on NEW ZEALAND IN THE FUTURE WORLD. These include "Societies in Change: a question of scale", "Resources and Technology: Sustainability", and "International Relations: Opportunities".

"In this transitional post-industrial era ... we need to examine the kind of culture which is being created through the mediation of our communication techniques". Alan Mirabelli is co-ordinating a project on COMMUNICATIONS: TECHNOLOGY AND THE HUMAN PROCESS for the Vanier Institute of the Family (151 Slater Street, Ottawa KIP 5H3, Canada).

Arthur Cordell has sent us COMMUNICATIONS AND COMPUTERS: INFORMATION AND CANADIAN SOCIETY - available free of charge from the Publications Office, Science Council of Canada (100 Metcalfe, Ottawa K1P 5M1,Canada). It suggests that consumers may increasingly pay for their choice of a widening range of programmes and data offered by the media - including video games, video recorders, video discs, electronic newspapers, teleshopping, educational TV, and various forms of interactive communication with other consumers. A large number of specific consumer groups and interests may replace today's mass TV audience, and the impact of mass advertising associated with the passive broadcast medium may decline.

Members of the <u>Association Francaise de Prospective Sociale</u> believe that futures studies are for people, and that citizens must recover them from professional experts. Newsletters and meetings. Information from AFPS (7 rue de l'Arbalete, 75005 Paris, France).

FUTURE PERFECT in Undercurrents No.36, Oct/Nov '79 (27 Clerkenwell Close, London EClR OAT) described the work which Simon Nicholson (Open Univ., Oxford Research Unit, Boars Hill, Oxford) and Ray Lorenzo have been doing in Oxford and Naples with children as they develop their own ideas about possible futures.

A project on THE CHANGING EXPECTATIONS OF SOCIETY IN THE NEXT THIRTY YEARS and the implications for management (in the context of management education and management development) is being carried out jointly by the American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business (1755 Mass.Av.NW, Suite 320, Washington DC 20036, USA) and the European Foundation for Management Development (20 Place Stephanie, B-1050 Brussels, Belgium). Two colloquia were held in 1979, one at Windsor Castle in England and one in the US, and an international conference will be held in Paris in June. Opposing views of post-industrial society were put by Daniel Bell and Ignacy Sachs. Further information from AACSB or EFMD.

At a conference on WORK AND WEALTH which was held in Sydney, Cape Breton in October 1979, Walter Baker, Professor in Public Policy and Management and Chairman of the Centre for Policy and Management Studies, Univ. of Ottawa (Box 9382, Ottawa Postal Terminal, Ottawa, Canada KIG 3V1) strongly emphasised the need for effective management in a peoplecentred future. The conference was organised by Peter Dawson (Director of the Tompkins Institute, College of Cape Breton, Sydney, Cape Breton, Nova Scotia, Canada). A leading part was played by New Dawn Enterprises—Chairman Greg MacLeod (PO Box 1055, Sydney, Cape Breton, Nova Scotia)—a community development corporation active in business, social and cultural spheres. Also prominent were representatives of Devco (David Miller, Cape Breton Development Corporation, PO Box 1330, Sydney) who are encouraging the development of local activities—tourism, fishing, forestry, farming, etc., on an appropriate scale.

WORK AND THE FUTURE: TECHNOLOGY, WORLD DEVELOPMENT AND JOBS IN THE 80s is a report from the Industrial Committee of the Church of England's Board for Social Responsibility. £1 from CIO Publishing (Church House, Dean's Yard, London SWIP 3NZ).

THE FUTURE OF WORK, SHARING IN WORK and THE MICROPROCESSOR REVOLUTION are three discussion papers by Roger Clarke, Industrial Chaplain in Dundee. Details from The Industrial Organiser (The Home Board, 121 George Street, Edinburgh).

### RESEARCH, EDUCATION AND TRAINING

Peter Reason of the Centre for the Study of Organisational Change and Development (Univ. of Bath, Claverton Down, Bath BA2 7AY) is secretary of the NEW PARADIGM RESEARCH GROUP. However, the new garden city need not necessarily be built on a green field site, but possibly in a suburban area or inner city location. In a paper on SOCIO-CULTURAL ENVIRONMENT IN HUMAN SETTLEMENTS <u>Bhoo P. Agarwal</u> (Regional Planner, Ontario Region, Indian and Northern Affairs, 55 St. Clair Avenue East, Toronto, Canada M4T 2P8) discusses the conflict between the unique advantages of the urban environment in terms of accessibility, diversity, amenity, etc., and the disadvantages in terms of congestion, alienation, and diseconomy which are becoming increasingly more serious.

ECODEVELOPMENT AND THIRD WORLD URBAN REGIONS is a recent report by Simon Miles (2 Hawthorn Avenue, Toronto, Canada M4W 272) prepared for the Canadian International Development Agency and the Canadian Dept.of the Environment. He endorses the view that "the more extensive use we make of human resources, the more rapidly they increase". He is now encouraging the OECD and UN to support processes of development which are socially led.

The proceedings of the 1979 Town and Country Planning Summer School include an address by Michael Heseltine, Secretary of State for the Environment, on his philosophy about planning. # PAPERS, JOURNALS, NEWSLETTERS, DIRECTORIES, NETWORKS, ETC.

ANOTHER BRITAIN, a Bow Group paper (£1.50 from Bow Publications, 240 High Holborn, London WClV 7DT) by Nigel Forman MP is a welcome discussion by a Conservative MP of the possibilities for a more ecological future for Britain. A voluntary simplicity, small is beautiful, and conservationist approach to town and regional planning, transport policy and health are outlined. (ANOTHER BRITAIN was also the title of a paper by James Robertson - copies from the International Foundation for Development Alternatives, 2 Place du Marche, CH-1260 Nyon, Switzerland - in an IFDA series which included contributions by Willy Bierter, Anne Charreyron, John Turner, Narasim Katary, Cathy Starrs, Ignacy Sachs, and many others.)

APPROPRIATE TECHNOLOGY DEVELOPMENTS IN THE UNITED STATES AND THEIR RELEVANCE TO THE THIRD WORLD is published by the Development Centre, OECD (94 Rue Chardon-Lagache, 75016 Paris, France).
